Insulin Pumps and Use of Dressings

Patients should <u>not</u> be prescribed any dressing to keep insulin pumps in place.

Patients who are experiencing dislodgment of their pump cannula are to be referred back to their specialist immediately.

If a cannula dislodges during the night this could lead to a catastrophic failure of the pump and puts the patient at serious risk of Diabetic ketoacidosis (DKA).

It may be necessary to revert to prescribing of insulin in pen form if pump failure is suspected

FreeStyle Libre - REMINDER

Freestyle Libre should ONLY be initiated in Secondary Care.

Each patient should sign a contract and receive training before the GP practice takes over the prescribing of the product.

Freestyle Libre is only supported for patients who have Type 1 Diabetes and:

- Currently need to monitor blood glucose >8 times a day.
- Have Type 1 Diabetes and are pregnant
- Are unable to monitor blood glucose frequently due to a disability
- Where occupation prevents them from monitoring blood glucose regularly
- Patients with Type 1 Diabetes who suffer from recurrent severe episodes of hypoglycaemia.

If you are aware of any patient that has not received adequate training please contact the Medicines Optimisation Team as soon as possible; we can arrange for the appropriate training to take place.

eRD - Newly Registered Patients

When registering a new patient please check and ask they currently receive their medication via eRD.

If a patient has outstanding eRD items from their previous surgery these will still be valid. Therefore there is a risk that the patient could gain multiple supplies if new prescriptions are issued at the new Surgery.

COPD – Height and Weight Recording

During recent COPD EPIC clinics in practices, the clinicians have reported many inaccuracies in height and weight measuring equipment.

Height and age can be one of the most important variables in the measurement of many conditions, including spirometry. It is therefore imperative that these are recorded accurately as incorrect readings could have severe consequences to diagnosis or treatment.

For example failure to measure height accurately during a spirometry diagnosis or review will either mean:

- The patient is reported to be taller than they are,
 COPD could be falsely diagnosed
- The patient is reported to be smaller than they are, a COPD diagnosis could be missed.

Please ensure all height and weight measuring equipment is calibrated annually. Although no, longer part of QOF requirements, this will be expected when inspected by CQC.

Dosing for PPI and Comparative Equivalents

See table below for PPI comparative treatment and maintenance doses.

Oral Nutrition Supplements

Oral nutritional supplement usage continues to rise, below is a brief summary of current formulary first line option. Further detailed information is attached separately.

First line: Powdered ONS

Prescribe first, if food first strategies have not been successful. These products are powder sachets which need to be mixed with full fat milk.

Aymes® Shake (Aymes)
Complan® Shake (Nutricia)
Food Link ® Complete (Nualtra)

NB: Each of these products has a different taste and consistency. A patient should try <u>at least two 1st line</u> <u>preparations</u> before moving onto second line alternatives.

Second line: Liquid ONS

Prescribe only if patient is likely to have difficulty preparing powdered ONS or has lactose intolerance, or has tried and not tolerated the powdered ONS.

Emerade

All Emerade devices will be unavailable for the foreseeable future. On 28 November, the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) issued a Class 2 recall to pharmacy level. No further stocks of Emerade in all three strengths of 150mcg, 300mcg and 500mcg will be available from this date.
